
The fully subscribed workshops included large boxwoods, buttonwoods and cedar elms with Warren Hill: Japanese maple group planting, juniper on a slab and Kokonoe white pines with Larry Ragle: and large cotoneasters, narrow leaf ficus and cedar elm with Ernie Kuo. Mike Hansen led a youth workshop that produced some outstanding results.

Mike Hansen demonstrated the restyling of a black pine that included bending of very thick raffia-wrapped branches. Mike, former President of Bonsai Clubs International, also spoke about travels in China and discussed American and Chinese bonsai. Respected potter Don Gould gave a presentation called "Burnt Offerings" in which he discussed some of the history and philosophy of bonsai containers and another talk on the selection of bonsai pots. David De Groot, curator of the Weyerhaeuser Company's Pacific Rim Bonsai Collection, gave talks about Horticultural Aspects of Bonsai and Bonsai Refinement. Vito Megna took us on a vicarious bonsai collect-

ing trip in Texas. David Schlesser and Dave Roberts spoke about "The Environment, Bonsai, and You". Ernie Kuo demonstrated refining an existing bonsai and Warren Hill demonstrated construction of a cedar elm forest. The audience watched with fascination as Warren fit a group of huge trees on a slab.




chance to purchase the first copies of the book, Basic Bonsai Design by David De Groot. David's hand was sore as a long line of people asked him to autograph the book.
